Jane Nelson is Director of the Corporate Responsibility Initiative at Harvard Kennedy School and a nonresident senior fellow at the Brookings Institution. She has co-authored five books and over 90 publications on corporate responsibility, public-private partnerships, and the role of the private sector in sustainable development

Anja Nikolova, a Rotary global grant scholar, graduated in 2017 with a master's degree in environmental management from the Yale School of Forestry and Environmental Studies and the Yale Center for Business and the Environment. 



Over 20 years ago, Ken and Cindy Boyd considered adoption after Liz Hosmer did a program. Ken related carrying \$10,000 to Russia to meet young siblings Anna and Tyler. Tyler, now home on military leave from Japan,

recalled eating the orphanage wallpaper. Though undernourished, they were truly loved by their caretakers. Anna is now married and has two children.

Liz Hosmer's oldest brother, Richard, was adopted as an infant. In adulthood he searched and found his birthmother, which grew familial ties.

Almost 50 years ago, Newby and Georgia Herrick adopted their daughter Holly domestically as an infant and son Lee from Korea at 11 months. Georgia recalled the differences in the children's ability to adjust. Holly and Lee each have one daughter, with Lee's daughter adopted from China.

A two year wait and a call of a newborn from Bethany Christian Services, gave Corrie Dirksen Toste and husband John their son, Luke. As a newborn he needed medical intervention, but today, he's a happy, healthy toddler.

Every adoption is unique, but each family was blessed and humbled by their children. It really brought home the significance of 'Family of Rotary'.

New Event Slated to Honor All Veterans in Mariposa County

When Ophelia McInturff started her term as president of the local Rotary Club, she knew she wanted to do something to help veterans.

As part of a service organization, every Rotary president is encouraged to start a community project they are passionate about. It didn't take long for McInturff to make up her mind. "My passion has always been for U.S. veterans," said McInturff. So she shared her idea with other Rotary members who happen to be veterans, of holding a day outside of Veterans Day, to honor those who have served. "They loved it," McInturff said. "They thought it was a wonderful idea."



For the first time ever, the Mariposa Yosemite Rotary Club will be holding the Veterans Appreciation Day on Sunday, March 25 from 2-5 p.m. at the Mariposa County Fairgrounds. The event is a tribute to servicemen and women and their families. It will offer them a complimentary lunch, patriotic music, recognition of service, keepsake items and more. It is free for veterans and their guests to attend. Rotary will be covering all expenses for the event.

"There is never enough appreciation for our veterans," McInturff said. "It's a project I would like Rotary to take on. I'm so excited for this project." Steve's Sportsmans Cafe is providing a complimentary tri-tip lunch. Sierra Tel donated \$1,000 and the American Legion donated \$100 to the event. The Mariposa County High School band will be performing patriotic musical numbers.

There will be "testimonials," or stories shared by select veterans and a special guest speaker, to be announced. Each veteran will receive keepsake American flag pins, which read "service above self." "We'll be recognizing each veteran for their service and continued service in the community," McInturff said. A local service dog program is also slated to be there for interaction with veterans who may be interested in learning more about the program.

The event is officially sponsored by Mariposa County. The County is allowing Rotary to utilize County transit vehicles to shuttle veterans to the event who otherwise could not attend. Rotary is hoping for 250 veterans, and each veteran is encouraged to bring guests. In total, Rotary is planning for up to 500 people. "Our goal is to be able to get all the veterans there," McInturff said, "and back safely to their homes." Rotary will be sending personal letters to veterans in the community inviting them to come. Those who don't receive a letter can RSVP by calling (209) 628-7439.

McInturff said it should be an annual event. McInturff said the event was scheduled in March to avoid conflict and "clashing" with other holidays and events. March 29 is National Vietnam War Veterans Day, and it made sense to hold the event in March. For more on the local Rotary, visit www.mariposarotary.org.


