Modesto Rotary Club Proud to Support Little Free Libraries

Reading is one of the fundamental skills any child must develop. It is said that until the third grade, children are “learning to read.” After that, they are “reading to learn.” But despite the inspired efforts of teachers across the land, not every family has the capacity to provide books for youngsters to enjoy at home.

Recognizing a need in many households, the Modesto Rotary Club decided in 2016 that it wanted to participate in the Little Free Library program to increase access to books in the Modesto area.

Little Free Libraries have sprung up all over the country. They are an increasingly popular way to spread the joy of reading. The concept is simple: Individuals or groups (like Rotary) find an appropriate location, construct a weatherproof library, fill it with fun books ... and let the reading begin.

“Checkout” is on the honor system. Families are encouraged to read and return as many books as they like, and even donate some from their own home libraries for others to enjoy.

In Modesto, the Rotary Club partnered with the nonprofit Stanislaus Community Foundation to pay for the materials for the library. High school students at the Stanislaus Military Academy, run by the county Office of Education, built four libraries. Students in the wood shop at Modesto High School constructed another.

Rotarians painted the libraries vibrant colors and collected books to stock them. They also worked with schools and community organizations to identify under-served locations in the city where the libraries could potentially do the most good. In many cases, Rotarians also installed the libraries.

Since last fall, libraries have been “planted” near a community center at James Marshall Park and at three elementary schools. A fifth is awaiting dedication at the Stanislaus County Boys & Girls Club.

“It’s a project that we felt strongly about,” said Pete Herrmann, the 2016-17 Modesto Rotary Club President. “We recognize that giving back to our community is at the heart of our mission. The libraries we’ve partnered on have been such a big hit that we’re planning to dedicate some of our community grant funding to build at least three more in the next year.”
